Uncovered health care expenses and becoming ill are among the highest concerns cited by middle-income baby boomers. Most boomers who are within a few years of turning 65 do not understand what their health insurance benefits will be for doctor visits or hospitalization once on Medicare, and having a good understanding of how the program works is an important step in alleviating the confusion associated with the transition to Medicare. Working with Medicare-eligible individuals includes helping them understand their benefits under their Medicare plan. Nurses have a significant impact on the care of these patients effecting both outcomes and quality of life. The 2013 American College of Cardiology Foundation/American Heart Association (ACCF/AHA) Heart Failure treatment guidelines are a research-based model of management for each stage of HF. 7:45 p.m.	Coordinating Care Using Transitional Strategies, Lecia Snell, MSN, APRN-CNS, CCTN Hospital readmissions can lead to poor patient outcomes, increased costs and financial penalties to hospitalizations. Nurses are at the center of care coordination to help reduce these potential preventable hospitalizations. Transitional care management has become the core of coordination for patients moving between care venues. Using a case study scenario, this presentation will describe evidence-based transitional care strategies and resources to help the nurse apply to their practice and build a strong foundation for care coordination.

8:45 p.m.	Palliative Care and Its Impact on Patient Outcomes, Mark Leenay, MS, MD For patients hospitalized with serious illnesses and their families, the goal of palliative care is to provide critical support by providing information about prognosis, ensuring that symptoms are managed, helping to clarify goals of care, and addressing psychosocial and spiritual concerns. The palliative care paradigm uses a multidisciplinary approach to provide palliative care to relieve and prevent the suffering of patients throughout the continuum of an illness. Palliative care can be offered to patients at any time between diagnosis and recovery.
	Once patients are discharged, many hospital-based palliative care teams cannot continue to play active roles in patient care. It has been suggested that understanding the prognosis, being prepared to manage symptoms and knowing whom to call with questions would help families cope more effectively with the challenges of life-threatening illness.
	During this session, Dr. Leenay will explain how palliative care offers support for both patients and their families, how to improve the quality of life for persons suffering from serious illness, the impact on clinical outcomes, and medical costs and tools that can be used to help patients with the discharge transition from hospital.
